Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

At their January meeting Councillors made the following comments on a number of planning applications, which included:-

Proposed erection of a 3 bedroom chalet style bungalow at Comet House, Ellesmere Road, St Martins, Shropshire SY11 3HT – the Parish Council had no comments to make on this application.

Residential Development land west of Baytree Close, St Martins, Shropshire for the erection of 3 terrace style dwellings, formation of vehicular access off Baytree Close and associated parking (revised scheme). The Parish Council were concerned over the surface water drainage in this area and thought three dwellings would be an over development of this site. In addition they agreed that no development should be considered or approved from a private driveway but from an adopted road with street lighting to an LED standard.

Concern was again expressed over the speed of traffic through St Martins and the police had been notified of this. The police had stated that they had already used the Speed Gun in the village and had recorded the speeds. They will continue to do this as and when they are able to do so and will then build up some data that they will forward to the parish council in due course.

A report was received from the Street Lighting committee who are looking at the possibility of improving the lighting in the village by installing LED light units which will also reduce energy costs. An annual maintenance check will be carried out during the next few weeks which will then highlight which columns may need replacing and the costs involved.

Various highway issues were raised which have been reported to Shropshire Council Highways Department. These included; road markings on either side of Escob Bridge need re-painting plus a new pothole has opened up just as you reach the road sign warning of horses crossing - road surface very pitted on the Overton Road at New

Ifton - manhole cover opposite Chapel in Ellesmere Road sinking badly and pot holes reported in Cottage Lane by Cross Lanes Farm and the junction to the new barn conversions. Members expressed their deep concerns that Shropshire Council's Cabinet had decided at their meeting in December not to pass on to parish and town councils in Shropshire any of the council tax support grant they receive from the government, but to use this as to balance their own books. This they felt was a blatant political ploy by Shropshire Council to freeze their council tax and look good while parish council's like St Martins would have to increase their tax level by up to 11% to maintain the services they provided in 2014/15 or be forced to reduce spending on services, or to cut services altogether. The Parish Council will be setting their budget and precept at their next meeting on the 12th February 2015. Edward Davies FILCM,

All our volunteers are highly trained and are carefully selected in order to be suitably matched with the client. All volunteers are also subject to a DBS (criminal records) check before being approved by the My Guide Service. The working partnership between a My Guide and the client lasts for a period of six months and is regularly reviewed, with no obligation on either party.

The aim of such a working partnership is to increase confidence and promote independence, allowing the client to meet up with friends and to participate in activities in the community. It also provides a means of simply getting out of the house, away from the isolation that comes with visual impairment, motivation to get out and attempt new experiences.

St Martins Book Group




January 2015





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Good Garage Scheme

St Martins Allotment Association

January and February does not see many of us up at the allotments apart from the occasional visit to check that all is well, like the need to keep snow brushed off the protective netting or try to rescue anything that has been blown over.

Also the occasional forays to pick vegetables that are still available like cabbages, Brussels sprouts, parsnips and carrots (if the ground is not too frozen).

This does not mean that the allotments are forgotten. We are still eating raspberries, rhubarb, strawberries, runner beans, cauliflower and peas that were put in the freezer through the summer, as well as the potatoes and apples that were stored.

I have already taken delivery of next years seeds and seed potatoes and distributed them to our members.

The potatoes will soon need to be 'chitted'. This is where the potatoes are put onto trays with the 'eye' facing upwards and placed somewhere light and frost free. This produces shoots which will give them a good start when planted.

Also, now is the time to prune 'standard' fruit trees and so we need to wrap up warmly or it will be a rushed job.

We are still planning and looking forward to the next growing year and also have to try and resist the temptation to plant too early. Late heavy frosts can do so much damage.



On the other hand the internet is not a boon especially when we hear about the horrors that social media generates, even to the simple point that it has made the teenager's bedroom no longer a

I enjoy its benefits and am very wary about its capacity to compromise our life and disturb the calm and contentment that we have found in coming to live in St. Martins. I suppose the analogy is with going out for a walk. The lanes are peaceful and interesting. There is much to take in, not least in the effect of the

weather and the season on the flora and the fauna. The fields are soft underfoot and reveal the lovely views that high hedges can obscure. It makes so much accessible and is so convenient but it generates, also, many vulnerabilities, and many of these vulnerabilities were already within us and the internet is just another way of highlighting them. So, my message is? Treat the

internet - and especially yourself - with care. Tread carefully but don't stop going forward. And if this all familiar and basic to you then share it gently and patiently with the sceptical. Let it encourage you and them to develop a broader band of interests and strengthen fibre! Don Borland

Three Parishes Big Local January 2015

Our BIG headlines this month are that we have awarded more Community Chest grants, hosted our first Community event, and that we will be launching credit union services with FAIRshare Credit Union in February 2015.

Our Community Chest panel have approved grants to Gobowen WI towards the cost of a jewellery making course, 2nd St Martins Scouts towards the cost of archery and camping equipment and to St Johns Church towards the cost of chairs and tables for a Community café. There are more grants of up to £500 available for new and established community groups, projects or activities within the Three Parishes Big Local area. Applications forms and full details are available on our website, <u>www.big-local.org</u>, or by contacting the Big Local Co-ordinator.

We organised our first community event on Saturday 15th November – the Big Get Together, which took place at St Martins School Sports Hall. The event was an opportunity for residents to find out about what goes on in the area. We would like to thank all the community groups from St Martins, Weston Rhyn and Gobowen that brought their displays to the event. There were lots of great entries for our "Love where you live" competition and congratulations go to Tilly Manford, Lowri Smith, Kelsey Owen and Sue Barnett who were all category winners. We are planning a second community event for May 2015 – look out for details about the activities and competitions in local press and on local notice boards.

<u>"There will be no risk of exclusion for any reason"</u> is one of the Community aspirations that we are working towards through the Three Parishes Big Local Community plan. Financial exclusion can mean that individuals or families sometimes struggle to make ends meet or to buy essential items. Borrowing from doorstep lenders, payday lenders or loan sharks could seem like the only option , but this can attract high rates of interest and borrowers may end up paying back much more than they borrowed. FAIRshare credit union provides straightforward savings accounts and affordable loans to its members. We are working with FAIRshare to bring their services to our villages by providing a weekly FAIRshare Service Point in each of the three villages of St Martins, Weston Rhyn and Gobowen. Launching in February, residents will soon be able to sign up at one of the launch events or by going along to a FAIRshare Service Point.

The Three Parishes Big Local car share scheme was launched in December. Car sharing is a great way to save money on fuel and parking costs, reduce your carbon footprint and reduce congestion on our roads. You can car share for different reasons and different types of journey, for example:

> Getting to and from work Travelling to an event

Doing the weekly shop Getting your children to and from school One off journeys

The feedback that we received during the Big Local consultation process highlighted that there is a need to improve youth activities, particularly in Weston Rhyn. Our Community and Youth worker, Andy, is planning to canvas the young people of the village to find out what activities, facilities and support they would like to be able to access within their village. To help get this up and running, we are looking for a local volunteer (aged 18+) to spend some time meeting and talking to the young people of the village with Andy. If you would like to be involved and are open-minded, enthusiastic, happy to be outdoors, and have a real interest in the issues affecting young people please get in touch with Andy by emailing info@big-local.org or ringing 01691 656882 during office hours. We will provide access to youth work training for any volunteers for this project if appropriate.

First aid is a simple skill, but it has an incredible impact. We are hoping to arrange basic first aid courses that will be free of charge to residents of all ages in Gobowen, St Martins and Weston Rhyn. Please contact the Big Local Co-ordinator and let us know by the end of February if you are interested in registering for a place on one of the courses, or if you are interested in being trained to become a first aid trainer. We will do our best to arrange the days, times and venues of courses to suit as many of the people who register as possible.

Andy, our Community & Youth Worker, is working on a project to develop sports, clubs, hobbies and pastimes for the over 50s in our villages. If you have any ideas about the types of activities that could be set up, please get in touch.
