Well, we approach the end of another year and it gives me enormous pleasure, on behalf of every one of our Parish Councilors, to wish **EVERYBODY** in our fantastic village, a **VERY HAPPY** and **PEACEFUL CHRISTMAS** and a **JOYOUS NEW YEAR** and also, to use this opportunity to give my personal thanks to all of our councilors, who freely give their time and effort in making our village the most professionally run and operated across our county.

The past year has seen our Parish Council take control of more services from Shropshire Council. We are now responsible for the cutting of roadside grass verges and we hope to have secured a three-year contract for that service, based on all of the positive responses from our parishioners, advising how well our village has looked since we took control; we now control the maintenance of our Public Footpaths; we own and control more street lights then ever before and we are now looking at the renewal of street nameplates.

The Parish Council is here to represent the views of all residents across our wonderful village and we welcome input from as many directions as possible. But you can't forget that we are all volunteers and we now need **YOU** to join our Council. Without a full compliment of Councilors, it puts pressure on the remaining officials.

We presently have vacancies, so PLEASE consider joining us.

Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

The Parish Clerk reported that there were still two vacancies on the Parish Council. Application forms can be obtained from the Parish Clerk. With the next local elections scheduled for May next year, this would be a good opportunity for any interested residents to join the Parish Council to see how everything operates before the elections next year.

Following several incidents in the village over the last few weeks, the Parish Council agreed to look at installing another defibrillator on the west side of the village. The owner of Lens Fish & Chip shop has already agreed to one being fixed to the outside wall of his shop.

On highways, Shropshire Council have confirmed that the salt bins at either end of School Lane have been replenished with grit. The Parish Council, after discussions with several residents in Kimberley Lane, are now investigating the possibility of installing several Speed Bump kits on a trial basis along this lane to try and restrict motorists using this lane as a 'Rat Run' between Ellesmere Road and Overton Road. Consultations will now be held with officers from Shropshire Council. However, this could be a drawn-out process, following the Chairman and Parish Clerk's reported lack of response they are experiencing from various officers at Shropshire Council. Should this continue then it was agreed to bring this to the attention of our MP Helen Morgan.

The Parish Council expressed concern that the Planning Inspectors working on the Shropshire Local Plan have recently written to Shropshire Council informing them that the hearing sessions for the examination of the Shropshire Local Plan have been cancelled. It was also noted that a Development Manager from Berrys, property consultants in Shrewsbury representing the Brynkinalt Estate, have requested a meeting with the Parish Council regarding proposals they are developing to provide housing (at least 60 dwellings) on a site at Moors Bank identified in the emerging Shropshire Local Plan. It was also noted that during the latest review of the Shropshire Local Plan, the Parish Council had strongly objected to any future development on this site.

There are concerns over speeding vehicles on Overton Road recently, with accidents having been reported. Various methods of reducing speed are being considered, all of which have to be signed off by the police, and of course this does take time. Then there's the responsibility of drivers to abide by the current speed limits in the village. At present it is 30mph, but discussions are being had to reduce this to 20mph.

Work is continuing at the school to push for 'no parking' lines. Funding has to be agreed with the Parish Council, but I'm sure you have already seen the planters on the grass verge ready to be planted up by the school, which will look lovely next year when they're in flower.

As for Shropshire Council, it is struggling with funding - this revolves around the massive costs of adult social care and children's social care which has jumped up significantly and that Governments don't fund. This is now approximately £600m a year, a staggering amount, which leaves much less for just everything else.





SNOWMAN CUPCAKES





************* ** Ingredients * For the cupcakes: * * 200g/7oz caster sugar * 175g/6oz plain flour * **

* 175g/6oz plain flour

* 50g/1¾oz cocoa powder

* 1½ tsp baking powder

* ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda

* pinch salt

* 100ml/3½fl oz sunflower of

* 2 large free-range eggs

* 2 tbsp soured cream

* 125ml/4fl oz boiling water

* For the buttercream:

* ** 100ml/31/2fl oz sunflower oil

200g/7oz unsalted butter, softened

** For the buttercrear*

** 200g/7oz unsalted butt

** 400g/14oz icing sugar

** 1–2 tbsp milk

** To decorate:

** 100g/3½oz white ready

** rroll fondant icing

** Orange food colouring

** Red food colouring pas

** 12 white marshmallows

** Black writing icing tube

** 2 tsp desiccated cocon

** 12 pretzel sticks, broke 100g/3½oz white ready-to

Orange food colouring paste

Red food colouring paste

12 white marshmallows

Black writing icing tube

2 tsp desiccated coconut

12 pretzel sticks, broken in half

Method

Preheat the oven to 170C/160C Fan/Gas 31/2 and line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper cupcake cases.

Sift the sugar, flour, cocoa, baking powder, bicarbonate of soda and salt into a large mixing bowl. Stir in the sunflower oil, eggs and soured cream until smooth. Add the boiling water and beat again until silky smooth.

Scoop the batter into a jug and pour evenly between the paper cupcake cases. Bake for 20-22 minutes until well risen and a wooden skewer inserted into the middle of the cakes comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

To make the buttercream, beat the butter until pale and light, then gradually stir in the icing sugar and milk until smooth.

Make the snowman noses with 25g/1oz of the fondant icing. Add tiny dots of orange food colouring paste using a wooden skewer and knead until completely orange. Roll into 12 small carrot shapes about 1cm/1/2 in long. Leave to dry for 30 minutes.

Tint the remaining icing red using the food colouring paste. Dust a work surface with icing sugar and roll into a neat 12cm/4½ in x 6cm/2½ in rectangle. Slice into 12 strips about ½ cm wide, to make the snowman scarves.

Use the black writing icing to draw eyes and a mouth onto each marshmallow and stick an icing carrot just below the eyes.

Spread the buttercream on top of each cake and press a marshmallow into the icing. Scatter over the desiccated coconut and push two pretzel halves into each side of the cupcake for arms. Pipe black icing buttons onto the buttercream and wrap a red scarf around each marshmallow.

Speed

Speed Surveys were completed in St Martins, Whittington and Weston Rhyn on Tuesday 5th November 2024. Each location was visited for an hour each with both directions on the road monitored.

Overton Road, St Martins, saw an average speed of 23mph and 25mph in a 30mph limit.

B5009, Whittington, saw an average of 34mph and 32mph in the 40mph limit.

Station Road, Weston Rhyn, saw an average of 27mph and 26mph in a 30mph limit.

A small number of vehicles were recorded doing excess speed and will be hearing from the Rural North team in the near future.

Surveys and enforcement will continue to take place across the Rural North areas at different locations and times where permitted as these work towards the set Parish Council Priorities.

The Moors Chapel

1829 to 12 January 2025

As you can see the Moors Chapel nearly made it to 200 years old. The present chapel was rebuilt in 1870 in Stone. The first chapel was built in wood on a stone foundation. It burnt down. It was supported by the canal workers and the miners.



It's most vibrant time, for those who are still alive, was up to the mid-1980s. Everyone has fond memories of the community in Moors Lane centred around the chapel. Here are some – The wood stove in the centre of the far wall of the chapel; the small dais in the front far side corner, even standing there and reciting. The carnivals and processions; the Sunday school outings, the swimming. Once the Hall arrived there were many gatherings and teas and some remember the discos. There were camping trips to Shell Island and to Llanrhaeadr, in the field by the waterfall.

It is sad for the whole area that it is now time to close the chapel. So many people cannot believe it is closing, but it has become a necessity. The chapel members will grieve its loss, but we will find new openings in our faith journey.

FRIENDS OF IFTON MEADOWS



So this is Winter. We are approaching a Happy New Year, and Summer is a distant memory, but yet it is also our future, with thoughts and dreams of warm blue sky days to come!

Throughout last summer, April to the end of September we undertook our weekly butterfly count and although the numbers of different

butterfly species and the numbers of butterflies observed were reduced on previous year counts, we still had a good showing. It seems that when we had that cold wet spell in the early spring; April and May, it affected the early emerging butterfly cohorts and they never really managed to catch up. Yet we saw Speckled Woods in the woodland edge areas, Gatekeepers were eventually abundant in the birch field, and we saw more than usual in the old horse paddock/event field near the entrance. Both Ringlet and Meadow Brown numbers were down but not devastatingly so. Also observed were Small Copper, Common Blue, Green Veined White, Comma, Small Skipper, Small Heath and Peacock butterflies. But it appears an absence of Painted Lady, apparently, they stayed on the continent (could this be an effect of Brexit? LOL)

It is now Winter and we are a few short weeks from the Winter Solstice, the shortest day. The Winter Solstice occurs on Saturday 21 December at 9:19am this year in the UK, after the daylight hours start to become more than the darkness hours and the sap in the trees and grasses start again to rise, Hooray! But we are still in that nature dormancy, the leaves have been dehisced from the trees and shrubs and are forming a protective layer over ground and soil level flora and fauna. The natural world across the northern hemisphere of spaceship earth is largely asleep, deep hibernation for some and for other extended periods of sleep, a quiet time. When you walk the reserve, remember, for plants and animals are sleeping and need their rest. At this time of year, it is nice to stand/sit (if not too damp) and listen to a more silent landscape. And if you have a stethoscope with you, why not press it to the ground or to the boles of trees and listen, you might hear some gentle snoring of small mammals, beetles and of the trees themselves, so dig out your "Doctors and Nurses" play sets and have a go.

As we move into January, we will begin to see the emerging shoots of the snowdrops (January to March) and then their beautiful white and green tinged flowers. Pryces Dingle is always a good visit during this time of year, and we know that spring is just around the corner. Work on the Meadows: regular visitors will have noticed the ditching work and crossing points that have appeared that Shropshire Council Outdoor Partnership Team applied for and was successful for a grant from UK Government via UK Shared Prosperity Fund. (Full details on the notice board at the main entrance). Ed and Mike (warden) engaged contractors to do around the mound, hopefully this will provide drier access to the green footpaths from the main track, less of that sticky mud!.

The Meadows Volunteers have been busy in November reducing the numbers of Birch tree saplings from the top of the Skylark Mound. We do this so that we do not lose the open space on top of the mound where the Skylarks like to nest, they do not like to have potential predator perching points. We will continue to do this work into January, but hopefully will also have a go at a bit of Hazel Coppicing on the footpath below the mound. We need to check to see if there is anything that still needs to be done to the drainage in the Dingle to help keep the footpaths drier. But please stay off the mound towards the end of January onwards because the Skylarks will be returning and looking to build their nests.

We wish you a happy Solstice and Christmas and New Year and many enjoyable winter walks around the Ifton Meadows Local Nature Reserve.







Composting at Home: A Beginner's Guide

Composting is a fantastic way to reduce your household waste, and it's easier than you might think! By turning your kitchen and garden waste into nutrient-rich compost, you can feed your garden and do your bit for the environment. Here's how to get started:

1. Choose Your Composter:

 Plastic Compost Bin: Ideal for small gardens, these bins are compact and efficient. Look for one with a lid to keep out rain and pests.





 Wooden Compost Bin: Offers a more natural look and can be built at home. Or DIY with pallets.

• **Wormery:** Uses worms to break down food waste, perfect for those with limited space.



2. Find the Right Spot:

- Place your composter on bare soil in a sunny or partially shaded spot.
- Ensure easy access for adding materials and removing compost.

3. What to Compost:

- Greens (Nitrogen-rich)
- Vegetable and fruit peelings
- Grass cuttings
- Dead flowers
- Coffee grounds and tea bags
- Plant cuttings

- Browns (Carbon-rich):
- Cardboard (shredded) & toilet roll tubes
- Shredded paper
- Dry leaves
- Woody prunings hedge cuttings & wood chips
- Straw, hay & sawdust

4. Layering Your Compost:

- Aim for a roughly equal mix of greens and browns.
- Alternate layers of green and brown materials.
- Keep the compost moist but not soggy.

5. Turning and Aerating:

- Turn the compost every few weeks with a garden fork to aerate it.
- This helps speed up the composting process.

6. Be Patient:

- It takes time for compost to mature, usually between 6 months to a year.
- The finished compost will be dark brown and crumbly with an earthy smell.

7. Troubleshooting:

- Compost too wet: Add more brown materials or turn more frequently.
- Compost too dry: Add water or green materials.
- **Unpleasant smells:** Turn the compost more often and ensure a good balance of greens and browns.

Extra Tips for Success:

- Chop up larger materials to speed up decomposition.
- Don't add cooked food, meat, dairy, or pet waste to your compost bin.
- Consider adding compost activators to kickstart the process e.g. nettles, comfrey, peas, beans. coffee grounds, tea leaves and cooking oil.
