

## **Parish Council**

#### FROM THE CHAIR

On behalf of every one of our Parish Councillors, we wish you all a Very Happy New Year. I don't know if it was just me, but 2024 seemed to flash past in the blink of an eye.

Our work within the Parish Council has been generally successful, only delayed by constant lack of responses from Shropshire Council. We are not alone as, working alongside other local Town and Parish Councils, they too have exactly the same complaint. It really has been most frustrating as there is so much more that your Parish Council wished to achieve.

Anyway, there were some clear positives across the year:-

- 1) We now control all of the cutting of grass verges over our village and are making progress in consolidating the works as part of a longer-term plan.
- 2) We have appointed a village Councillor to form a group who now control and manage the footpaths across our village. They have been actively installing new metal 'kissing gates' which have replaced the old wooden stiles.
- 3) We have been the driving force concerning safety measures outside of the school. We have fully funded the kerbside planters and look forward to seeing the school continue the scheme by organising the planting of shrubs and flowers into them as a welcoming feature to the school approaches. So, no more vehicles parking on the grass and causing obstructions.
- 4) We have been assertive in getting parking restrictions along the roads by the school involving Yellow Lineage on roadsides and dedicated Bus Stop areas identified, and have been assured by Shropshire Highways that "the works will be completed by mid February". Let's hope that Shropshire deliver on their promise, especially as the only way to achieve the project was for us to fully fund the works.

5) We have made an application to Shropshire for a new Pedestrian-controlled crossing by

Stans. Shropshire have a suitable funding pot and just before Christmas we received a response advising that our project and grant application "fits nicely into the criteria" so let us hope that, with this positive response, we can bring the scheme to fruition.

So, onwards and upwards into 2025 and, with the local government elections (for Shropshire Council wards) being held in May, it could be an exciting time.

## Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

The last meeting of St Martins Parish Council was held in St Martins Village Hall on the Thursday 9th January 2025. Unfortunately, during the Christmas and New Year period very little gets processed due to Councils and businesses being closed.

With a representative of West Mercia Police from Oswestry Station present at the meeting, the subject of speeding through the village was again raised. They advised that speeding would continue to be a focus on the team going into the New Year with hopefully more activity carried out around this priority. Two Speed Surveys took place during December, happily with no offences recorded on the dates completed. Other traffic offences continue to be monitored and action taken where appropriate to combat these issues. During December (and looked at previously) the team have looked at issues around the misuse of the mini roundabout at the Overton Road, Ellesmere Road and Green Lane junctions. 6 vehicles were stopped on one day within the space of 30-40 minutes as drivers had failed to adhere to the roundabout sign/markings. On these occasions, verbal warnings were given and all blew negative on breath test. Further patrolling, education and/or enforcement will be taking place at this location as some of the manoeuvres fell below the standard expected of road users.

In regards to drugs, intelligence and information continues to be collected for any drug issues identified in St Martins and is constantly evolving and being reviewed/ assessed. High visibility patrols continue to take place in locations identified as being subject to drug abuse or activities and this will continue to happen, with offenders dealt with appropriately.

The Parish Council have agreed to install an additional defibrillator in the village. This will be positioned on the outside wall of Lens Fish & Chip Shop.

The Parish Council have also agreed to replace the public notice board inside the bus shelter on Ellesmere Road, this is following vandalism to the locks.

Finally, the Parish Council precept has again be set with a zero percentage increase from last year.

Just a reminder that the Shropshire Council and Town & Parish Council election will be held on the 1st May 2025.

There has been a lot of concern over speeding in the village. The police have listened, and on occasions they are now visible in the village.

Also, we are getting closer to having parking restrictions at the school. Apparently a letter has gone out about where to park. One of the options given however is Morlas Meadows, which is a private road, owned by the residents, so please be aware of this.

There's been a lot of concern all over North Shropshire regarding telegraph poles going up everywhere. It's the battle of the fibre company connections and rather than them coming up with a deal to use the same poles, they are double-poling. Hopefully recent meetings have brought them together; we don't want our streets looking like the 1960s.

Things might be moving very slowly, but discussions are still on going for a lights crossing at Stans.

I'm not allowed to be political here, but just to make you aware, George Smith and myself will be standing as Independents at the elections in May. We want to put people before politics and be as effective as possible, and one of the reasons for my decision was the charge for green waste and the booking in system at the recycling centres. I was totally against this and we will be backing others to get this overturned.

The Parish Council have spaces and they need you! Help make decisions, part of the village. Someone said to me last week Councillors don't work and I told them they're wrong; Our Parish Council does work and they're caring people.

Also if anyone fancies helping out at the village hall, please call in for a chat; find out what we do and if you can help.

While I'm talking about volunteers, this magazine does a great job and are always in need of help, the committee is shrinking and need people who can make the difference.

### Age-related cataracts


Cataracts are when the lens, a small transparent disc inside your eye, develops cloudy patches.

Over time these patches usually become bigger causing blurry, misty vision and eventually blindness.

When we're young, our lenses are usually like clear glass, allowing us

to see through them. As we get older, they start to become frosted, like bathroom glass, and begin to limit our vision.

Cataracts usually appear in both eyes. They may not necessarily develop at the same time or be the same in each eye.





Can I ride my e-scooter to school or work?

No, it's Illegal...

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles and are required to be taxed and insured. It's not possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them.

Can I ride my e-scooter on the pavement?

No, it's Illegal...

You cannot use e-scooters on public footpaths, cycle lanes or roads.

What happens if I'm caught using my e-scooter in public spaces?

The scooter may be seized and as a result, destroyed.

If stopped by an officer, you may be asked to complete a breath and drugs test. You also risk a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for no insurance.

# 5 Ways to Help Wild Animals Survive the Winter Time

### .Make a wood pile for wildlife

 When Pruning the trees in your garden, don't throw away the cut-offs, instead use them to make a wood pile for wildlife. This will help out our 'sleepier' species, such as newts, certain beetles and plenty of other insects, who are looking for a place to get cosy and shut down for the winter.

#### Plant a tree

• Even though many of the trees around us are turning orange and gold, and will eventually have no leaves at all, this is still a great time to plant a tree. Flowering fruit trees can create whole ecosystems. One apple tree can provide homes for earwigs, spiders, moths, beetles, birds and much more. Fruit trees also develop decaying wood and fungi earlier than other trees, which means they're also a 'priority habitat' for rare species. Not only that, but did you know fruit trees can help with drought tolerance?

### Plant spring flowering bulbs

As well as planting trees, why not plant some spring flowering bulbs? Pick ones
that are good for pollinators like bluebells and get your garden buzzing in early
spring! Make sure that you choose native species and only buy the bulbs from a
reputable garden centre or shop – never take bulbs from the wild. We rely on
pollinators for every third mouthful we eat, so help them out by filling your garden
with their favourite snack.

#### Introduce a water feature

• Autumn and winter are great times to introduce a water feature to your garden. Amphibians like newts, frogs and toads use water as shelter and breeding grounds when spring arrives. Butterflies get valuable minerals and salts from slightly muddy water, and birds use water to bathe and remove parasites. It is important to keep the water topped up during the chilly winter months as sources of water can become frozen and more difficult to find. To make it as appropriate as possible, ensure your water source is shallow with gradual and rough-textured edges. This will mean that anything that climbs in can get out again.

### Maintain your bird boxes

 Last but definitely not least, we can't forget about our feathered friends who are amazing to watch all year round.
 Help out the birds visiting your garden by installing and maintaining bird boxes for them to roost in over winter.



### FRIENDS OF IFTON MEADOWS



As you read this it is February 2025 and still Winter! And I hope unlike me you have managed to keep your New Year's Resolution... mine was to get up every day at 6am in the morning...unfortunately this was an instant failure as on New Year's morning I did not manage to get up until 7.30am..oh well! However, the year is still young and I can make amends in other ways, such as volunteering on the Ifton Meadows

Nature Reserve or even just visiting it and enjoying its bio-diversity. Public open space is continuing to be a rare and precious resource, so use it or lose it!

Spring is just around the corner, the Spring Equinox will occur on Thursday 20 March at 9.01 am, after that time the sun will be above the horizon for more time than it is below the horizon. So in February what can we expect to see? One of my favourite plants that flowers from the end of January through to April is the Lesser Celandine (*Ficaria verna*, used to be called *Ranunculus ficaria* and is a member of the buttercup family). This is a low growing bright yellow starry petalled flower. It grows in damp areas, alongside streams, in woodlands, along woodland edges and along footpaths. It is a bright splash of colour, like little drops of sunshine lying on the ground and found along most of the paths around the reserve. It is a valuable early flowering plant as it is a nectar source



for beetles, flies, bumblebees and others. I believe that the "verna" bit in its name relates to Vernal, which is "spring", the Vernal Equinox. Apparently, the leaves are high in vitamin C and have in days of old been used to prevent scurvy, some texts even say that the root nodes resembled haemorrhoids and that it was therefore used to treat piles and it had a local name of Pilewort (ref: The Woodland Trust). So, if you are a sufferer, then perhaps you could try sitting on a plant, and if you do, please drop us a line and let us know if it was beneficial (LOL). But by all accounts this is a beautiful little flower, a heralder of the warmer days to come, apparently the poet Wordsworth not only wrote about Daffodils, he also wrote three poems about the Celandine (he seems to have liked yellow flowers). And remember to visit Pryce's Dingle to view the snowdrops (and more Lesser Celandines).

Back to volunteering, unfortunately our December volunteer day was cancelled as it coincided with the December storm. However, January was more successful with an outing to remove more of the birch off the Skylark mound, by the way the Skylarks are now returning and gearing up to gain territory and nest. Let's hope we have a drier and warmer spring and summer this year to give them a chance. Remember not to walk on the skylark mound during the breeding season allowing these ground breeding birds to breed successfully. People and dogs can cause damage without meaning too.

We will be meeting up again at the reserve main entrance at 1.30pm on the second Sundays



of both February and March...if your new year's resolution was to do more for the environment or if you just fancy a working social event in the outdoors you are most welcome to join us.

So when you visit the reserve over the coming two months we hope that you are able to spot and enjoy the skylarks, Lesser Celandine, Snowdrops and of course all its other awakening flora and fauna and hopefully some warm and blue sky days.

### Coq au Vin Hot Pot

Serves 6 (generously)

- Olive oil and butter, for sautéing and roasting
- 500g mixed mushrooms, brushed and halved (button and portobellini)
- ¾ teaspoon Herbs de Provence
- 200g bacon, cut into thin strips
- 5 medium shallots, peeled and quartered
- 3 cloves garlic, finely diced
- 2 heaped tablespoons cake wheat flour
- 700g chicken thighs, skinless and deboned, cut into 2cm strips
- 250ml (1 cup) Chardonnay
- 15ml (1 tablespoon) tomato puree
- 1½ cups chicken stock
- 8 sprigs thyme
- 3 bay leaves
- 3 medium carrots, peeled and roughly chopped
- 5-6 large potatoes, washed (skin-on), thinly sliced
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1. Start by heating a knob of butter in a wide based pan. Add the mushrooms and brown over a high heat. They needn't be cooked through, just golden. Season lightly with Herbs de Provence, salt and black pepper. Remove from the pan and set aside.
- 2. To the same pan, add a drizzle of olive oil. Sauté the bacon until the fat renders and the edges turn golden and crisp. Remove with a slotted spoon and add to the mushrooms.
- 3. Heat another tablespoon of oil to the pan. Add the shallots and sauté over a medium heat until caramelized and soft, about 20 minutes. Stir through the garlic and cook for a further 2 minutes. Add the shallots to the mushrooms and bacon.
- 4. Place the flour in a shallow dish and season with salt and black pepper. Dredge the chicken pieces in the flour. Heat a little more oil in the pan and brown in batches until golden on both sides. Deglaze with La Motte Chardonnay, scraping up all the sticky bits on the base of the pan, then reduce the liquor by half.
- 5. Add the tomato paste, stock, thyme and bay leaves. Return the mushrooms, bacon and shallots to the pan. Add the carrots, cover with the lid on and simmer over a medium heat for about 35 40 minutes.
- 6. Preheat the oven to 200 C.
- 7. Blot the potatoes with paper towel to remove excess moisture. Place in a large bowl and drizzle with olive oil to coat, a tablespoon or two will suffice. Season lightly with salt and black pepper. Arrange the potatoes on top of the Coq au Vin. Brush with melted butter and bake until the potatoes are fork tender and golden, about 40 -45 minutes.
- 8. Scatter with thyme sprigs just before serving.

## Bus services through St Martin's

If you live or work in the village, chances are you will have seen a bus passing by every now and again. In the modern world we live in many of us enjoy the benefit of using our own car to get about. For some however, the bus is a lifeline to the outside world.

In the UK, bus services are generally operated on a 'commercial' basis where the bus company choose the route and times and plan to run enough buses to provide a service where they make a profit from the number of passengers carried. Where deemed necessary the County Council can step in and 'subsidise' a service by providing public money to the bus operating company to run a service. As you can imagine, funds for doing this dwindle every year. The buses that run through the village here are a mix of commercial and subsidised. These are:

Arriva Wales service 2 from Oswestry to Wrexham via Park Hall, Gobowen, St. Martins, Gledrid, Chirk, Cefn Mawr, Acrefair, Plas Madoc, Ruabon, Johnstown, Ponciau and Wrexham (7 days per week)

Arriva Midlands service 53 from Oswestry to Ellesmere via Park Hall, Gobowen, St. Martins and Dudleston Heath (2 schoolday journeys and all the Saturday service run by Lakeside Coaches). (Doesn't run on Sundays)

Traws-Cymru service T12 from Newtown (Powys) to Wrexham via Montgomery, Welshpool, Guilsfield, Arddleen, Four Crosses, Pant, Morda, Oswestry, Gobowen, St. Martins, Gledrid, Chirk and Wrexham Maelor Hospital (branded as Traws-Cymru and operated by Tanat Valley Coaches). (Doesn't run on Sundays)

All these routes serve Moors Bank and the stops at St. Martins School. The 53 serves these stops too, then runs along Overton Road, past Stans and along Ellesmere Road. Some of the physical bus stops have vanished over time but they are still officially in use and plans are in hand to reinstate the missing signs in the coming weeks. These are at The Keys, The Old Post Office at the junction of Ifton View, and near Marsland Close.

Some facts you may not know:

- -All of these services offer the ability to pay by cash or contactless cards.
- -OAP / Disabled 'concessionary' passes are valid on these routes (all day at weekends and after 0930 weekdays). If you live in Shropshire your 'English' pass can be used to travel over the border into Wales (and back!) but not for local journeys within Wales. So, you can go for the day to Welshpool on the T12 for example, just not from Welshpool to Newtown. Every time you use your pass the bus company receives a payment helping to make that service pay
- -The number 2 is the only bus that runs on Sundays in the whole of the county of Shropshire
- -Full timetables are online or can be obtained from the bus companies. A summary of buses to and from the stop at St. Martins School (known as Beech Trees does anyone know why?
